# GREENE COUNTY PUBLIC HEALTH MONTHLY ACTIVITY REPORT July 31, 2025

## 1. Foundational Capabilities

- a. Administration
  - i. Whether you view the changes at the federal level as an opportunity or a collapse, due to actual or perceived changes in funding, infrastructure, or practices, show up and be determined to engage in and strive for improvements to health systems that lead to better health outcomes for individuals, families, employers, and the community. Various sources of current happenings in healthcare are included in this monthly activity update to inform our community of current and evolving events.
  - ii. Proposed changes and cuts to Medicaid, Medicare, and Marketplace health insurance are raising concerns for Greene County residents. Ohio expanded Medicaid eligibility under federal guidelines in 2014, allowing adults earning less than 138% of the federal poverty level to have access to health insurance. The federal government funded 100% of the expansion at that time, but the rate was gradually reduced to a 90%-10% split between the State and federal government. In June 2025, the Health Policy Institute of Ohio published the 2025 Ohio Medicaid Expansion Study. Areas to pay attention to would be the impact on accessing healthcare to the "expansion" group, the impact on children, the impact on the state budget, the cost of coverage, the impact on the amount of money employers are paying in private insurance, and effect of increased rates to cover uncompensated care, and the overall economy. A federal workforce requirement for Medicaid recipients takes effect 1/1/2027.
  - iii. Ways we can help will be to have <u>Ohio Medicaid</u> resources available for questions, and understand that our friends and neighbors will be facing new rules, forms, and deadlines that may confuse or overwhelm them. Children and their families may need to be reminded to sign up for ongoing coverage based on eligibility and free lunches. Donating to food pantries and existing healthcare resources like Living Well, Bellbrook Open Arms, and knowing the locations of low-cost clinics like Five Rivers Greene County Health Center can keep everyone informed of where to go.
  - iv. There are also changes being made to Medicare. The Medicare Savings Program (MSP), which was to take effect last fall, to streamline and enroll people into an MSP, has been delayed until 2034, which will impact the cost of drugs, medical supplies, hospital stays, and nursing facility care. (Part A Hospital Insurance and Part B Medical Insurance). Medicare eligibility will be restricted to US citizens, green card holders, and legal immigrants from a few specific places.
  - v. Marketplace enrollees will need to update their income, immigration status, and other details to remain enrolled. The plans no longer automatically renew, so individuals will have to manually re-enroll every year during open enrollment. Open enrollment begins 11/1 and will end 12/15 instead of 1/15. Subsidies provided to new applicants for 90 days during the application process will need to prove eligibility before they receive





- subsidies. Marketplace eligibility changes for refugees, asylees, and temporary protected status begin 1/1/2027. DACA recipients will be ineligible to purchase insurance in all states effective 8/25/25. The changes to DACA are impacting local universities as students may be required to carry health insurance for enrollment or have a physical to enroll in certain programs.
- vi. Employers will likely be impacted by higher premiums to pay for uncompensated care, and emergency rooms are expected to be busier.
- b. How to be a resource at the local level.

- d. New Local Government Cyber Standards | CyberOhio have been set for local governments to comply with. The health district has a cybersecurity response plan developed for consideration by the Board of Health.
- e. <u>Bills</u> for review included in the monthly activity report are moving through the House and Senate. It should be noted that Ohio's Constitution Article II, Section 15 has a <u>single subject rule</u> written to prevent unrelated, far-reaching policy changes from being tucked into must-pass legislation like the budget bill to avoid public scrutiny. HB28 below was to be incorporated into the budget bill, but was vetoed out, and the House met to override the veto.






- f. HB 10 (Klopfenstein, Daniels) Regulate imitation meat and egg products in school lunches so that no lab meat is included in school lunches. Passed the House and is in the Senate AG committee.
- g. HB 28 (Mathews, Hall) Eliminate the authority to levy replacement property tax levies. The bill mandates that all ballot questions related to tax levies in excess of the ten-mill limitation be presented clearly with specific formatting and removes the option to renew or replace taxes for current operating expenses or permanent improvements. In Senate Ways and Means Committee. Legislation is co-sponsored by Representative Dean and Representative Brian Lampton.
- h. HB 57 (Jarrells, Williams) Regards school policies on administering overdose reversal drugs including safety, security, training and storage. Schools can accept monetary donation to support but does not specify partnering with local health district to provide Narcan through existing supplies. Provides district and parent notification and schools would need to report trends in use. It would be helpful to provide notification to health districts. The bill is in the Senate Education Committee.
- i. <u>HB 126</u> (Mathews A., Craig) Prohibit certain public nuisance actions. Legislation is in regard to marketing and distribution of opioids and lawsuits filed against pharmaceutical companies. The bill is in the Senate Judiciary committee.
- j. <u>HB 137</u> (Lorenz) Permit tax authority to decline submitting certain levy to voters. Health districts and libraries have levies approved by the County Commissioners as taxing authorities and this legislation changes the language from "shall" to "may" place a levy on the ballot. Since health districts receive no funding from County Commissioners, the Commissioners could hear the request and decline to place a health district or library levy on the ballot. In House Local Government committee with no co-sponsors.
- k. <u>HB 160</u> Liquor and Cannabis (Stewart, B.) To revise specified provisions of the liquor control, hemp, and adult-use marijuana laws and to levy taxes on marijuana. The bill is in the House Judiciary Committee.
- HB 162 Medical Records (Click, G) Relates to medical records of minors and to name the act the My Child-My Chart Act. Representative Dean is a co-sponsor. The bill is in the House Health Committee
- m. <u>HB 182</u> Public Water Systems (Dean, L) To prohibit a public water system from adding fluoride to its water. The bill is in the House Natural Resources Committee.
- n. <u>HB 198</u> Hemp (Fischer, T) To regulate the manufacture, distribution, and sale of inhalable and ingestible hemp products. Representative Dean is a co-sponsor of the bill as it is in the House Judiciary Committee.
- o. <u>HB 215</u> Property Tax Levies (Jarrells, D, Stephens, J) The bill is in the House Ways and Means Committee and prohibits most property tax levies submitted at a general election from taking effect in the current year.
- p. <u>HB309</u> Modifies the law governing the county budget commissions, property taxation, and alternate apportionment formulas for local government and public library funds. The bill is in the House Ways and Means Committee.
- q. <u>HB335</u> (Thomas) Regards the authority of the county budget commission allowing them to reduce appropriations. Regulate sales tax and carryover funds. There is a long list of opponents, and this will likely be rolled into other bills to address taxing issues but is in the House Ways and Means Committee.





- r. <u>HB364</u> Requires food service operations note certain food allergies on the menu. In House Agriculture committee.
- s. HB365 (Brennen) enacts a property tax refund is in the House Ways and Means Committee.
- t. HB370 (Dean, Newman) Enact the Ohio Prenatal Equal Protection Act which aims to provide legal protections for the unborn which some believe would eliminate all abortion and access to in vitro fertilization.
- u. HB380 (McNally, Fischer) Designate Migraine and Headache Awareness Month
- v. HB401 (Rader, Baker) Designate Myositis Awareness Month
- w. SB 69 (Romanchuk) Intends to reform the state's public retirement system law. In Senate Financial Institutions, Insurance and Technology Committee.
- x. SB 78 (Hicks-Hudson, DeMora) Establish and operate the Ohio Health Care Plan universal health care. The bill is in the Senate Financial Institutions, Insurance and Technology Committee
- y. SB 86 (Huffman, Wilkin) Regulate and tax intoxicating hemp, drinkable cannabinoid product. Senator Koehler is a co-sponsor, and the bill is in the Senate General Government Committee.
- z. SB147 (Reineke) Revise solid waste and construction and demolition debris laws that govern the transfer and disposal of solid waste and construction and demolition debris. The changes provide procedures for withdrawing from a joint solid waste district. Has passed the Senate and was introduced in the house. The bill is in the House Community Revitalization Committee and the scope of the bill has been narrowed to only Seneca County will be effective 9/30/25.
- aa. SB158 (Timken) To generally prohibit student cellular phone use in public schools. The bill passed the Senate and is in the House Education Committee.
- bb. <u>SB 161</u> SNAP (Schaffer Johnson) To require the Director of Job and Family Services to seek permission to exclude certain items from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program. This bill would require the Director to seek a waiver to exclude "junk food" from SNAP benefits. A similar provision was included in the budget to require JFS to seek a waiver to exclude sugar-sweetened beverages. The bill is in the Senate Health committee.
- cc. SB 166 Health Insurers (Manning) prohibit fees for electronic claims submission by health insurer and the Medicaid program. The bill is in the Senate Medicaid Committee.
- dd. SB 198 (Koehler) Ensures Community Health Centers can continue to purchase medications at a discounted price through the 340B Drug pricing program.
- ee. <u>SB 201</u> (Schaffer) revises milk inspection fees and is in the Senate finance and appropriations committee.
- ff. SB 203 (Schaffer) Requires political subdivisions to adopt a cyber security plan. The bill is in the Senate Financial Institutions, Insurance, and Technology Committee.
- gg. <u>SB209</u> (Curtona) Off label drug use known as the Jeff, Dave and Angie Patient Right to Try Act in the Senate Health and Human Services Health Care Committee.
- hh. SB 230 (Romanchuk) Allows pharmacists to screen, test and treat for certain health conditions like flu, COVID, and RSV.
- ii. SB 233 (Hicks-Hudson) Creates the Ohio local and organic food and farm task force.



#### 3. Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP)

a. Greene County Medical Reserve Corps – First Aid Station at Yellow Springs Festival, June 28<sup>th</sup>, 2025. The team of five nurse volunteers and one layperson provided the community with a total of 45 volunteer hours of a total economic value of \$1,192.20. People were getting too warm from the heat and needed to be monitored and offered water and cooling interventions to ensure safe recovery before returning to the festival. A total of 26 client encounters were recorded, with ages from 18 to 67, with an average age of 36. The majority of cases involved heat-related illnesses, reflecting the warm and humid summer conditions typical of late June in Southwest Ohio. Of all events, heat-related symptoms accounted for 18 encounters (69%), making this the most common reason for care. These ranged from general overheating and fatigue to more severe presentations involving shortness of breath, dizziness, or lightheadedness.

- c. PHEP FY25 Grant update:
  - i. All 18 deliverables for the grant are complete and approved. Sixteen (\$110,875.00) out of 18 (\$87,725.52) deliverables for the grant have been paid.

#### 3. Environmental Health

- a. Food Establishment/Food Service
  - i. To date, there are two people tentatively scheduled to participate in the August ServSafe class. If no additional people sign up for the class, it will be cancelled.
  - ii. General and Special Services team members performed inspections at: Holy Guacamole (Hobson Park), Fairborn Block Party, Beavercreek 4<sup>th</sup> of July, Sidewalk Saturdays (Cedarville), Sonnycalb Fireworks, Yellow Springs 4<sup>th</sup> of July, Red, White & Blue Xenia Block Party, and other various single events where temporary licenses were issued.

#### b. Mosquito

- i. Four applications of adulticide were applied. Two applications were in response to WNV-positive pools of mosquitoes in Fairborn. Jamestown and Xenia have also had WNV-positive pools of mosquitoes with subsequent applications.
- ii. The mosquito control program continues with new trapping locations being identified.

#### c. Sewage

- i. Special Services has approved three Water Pollution Control Loan Fund (WPCLF) projects, and they are close to being permitted. There are two more WPCLF projects in process.
- ii. Special Services has seen an increase in site review applications for sewage systems.

#### 4. Health Education

- a. Creating Healthy Communities (CHC)
  - Fairborn's Active Transportation Plan went before the city council on July 7<sup>th</sup>. Adoption of Resolution 22-25 by the Fairborn City Council was recommended. The Active Transportation Plan will serve as a guiding document for infrastructure investment, transportation policy, and community development consistent with the Comprehensive Plan and supportive of community development goals for connectivity, safety, sustainability, and regional coordination.
  - ii. Unfortunately, the July Xenia Farmers' Market was canceled due to inclement weather. The next farmers' market will resume on Wednesday, August 20<sup>th</sup>, from 4-7 pm on Greene Street. Fourteen vendors have signed up to attend, offering a variety of products, including baked goods, produce, meat, and artisanal goods.
  - iii. The Greene County Food Council did not meet in July due to member commitments to attend the Greene County Fair. The council will meet on Thursday, August 28<sup>th</sup>, at 4:30 pm at OSU Extension Greene County (100 Fairground Road, Xenia, Ohio). At this meeting, members will be reviewing the council's action plan and working towards the council evaluation.

Families participating in both our programs will receive additional Baby Bucks from the Parenting Network for completing home visits with us. These Baby Bucks can be used to purchase items in their boutique.
- b. Early Intervention (EI)
  - i. Several staff completed multiple training courses towards renewing their Infant Mental Health credential. The final State Fiscal Year (SFY) marketing activity was completed by delivering information and promotional items to all pediatricians in Greene County.
  - ii. Staff have had several cases in need of extra work towards support and resources.
  - iii. Success Story:
    - a. K. Sullivan had a case where a mom left a domestic violence situation and did not have the correct car seat size for her child, leading to an open case with Child Services. Due to the agency's access to the car seats program and its dedication to maternal and child health, K. Sullivan was able to connect with the mom and secure the correct car seat for the baby.
