MONTHLY ACTIVITY REPORT

December 22, 2025

1. Foundational Capabilities

a. Administration

- i. GCPH New 2026 BOH President Sylvia Ellison and VP Tim Roop, Committee make up and Chairs of Committees (Planning and Finance, Governance and Performance Evaluation) are determined by the President.
- ii. O. Detty will work with S. Ellison to determine committee chairs and assignments.
- iii. End of year intern and preceptor surveys were sent out on December 16th, 2025. GCPH Leadership approved and hosted seven interns in 2025 and completed 24 internships since the internship program was updated in 2022.
- iv. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) announced new recommendations regarding the Hepatitis B vaccine for infants born to mothers who test negative for the virus. Individual-based decision-making in consultation with healthcare providers is used to determine the timing of the first dose. Denmark screens 100% of pregnant women for Hepatitis B and has follow-up to prevent transmission. In the United States, 12-18% of pregnant women are not tested, and only 35% of those who test positive complete follow-up care.
- v. United States Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) issued a Request for Information seeking public input on how to accelerate the adoption of artificial intelligence in clinical care.
- vi. Newborn screenings have added Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy and Metachromatic Leukodystrophy to the recommended Newborn screening panel.
- vii. The United States has a vaccine schedule that is different than other countries due to other countries having universal healthcare, more hours of paid parental leave, near-universal prenatal screening, centralized medical records and reliable follow up. These factors contribute to low disease burden. The US vaccine schedule lists the immunizations needed for school, what insurance must cover and which vaccines can be received through the vaccine for children program which pays for more than half of the vaccines given to children in the US. The schedule also affects which vaccines are covered by the Vaccine Injury Compensation program (VICP). Without VICP liability will increase, and manufacturers may discontinue production due to expense and disease burden will increase.

b. Legislative Updates

- HB 10 (Klopfenstein, Daniels) Regulate imitation meat and egg products in school lunches so that no lab meat is included in school lunches. The WIC program would need to seek a waiver from the federal government if foods using the products were included on the approved food list. The bill passed and was signed by the Governor 12/19/2025.

- HB 28 (Mathews, Hall) Eliminate the authority to levy replacement property tax levies. The bill mandates all ballot questions related to tax levies in excess of the ten-mill limitation be presented clearly with specific formatting and removes the option to renew or replace taxes for current operating expenses or permanent improvements. In Senate Ways and Means Committee. Legislation is co-sponsored by Representative Dean and Representative Brian Lampton.
- HB 57 (Jarrells, Williams) Regards school policies on administering overdose reversal drugs, including safety, security, training, and storage that can be based on a model policy. Schools can accept monetary donations to support the program. The district provides parent notification, and schools would need to report trends in use. An amendment was attached to this bill allowing students to have release time for religious instruction. Passed and is effective 01/19/2026.
- HB 126 (Mathews A., Craig) Prohibit certain public nuisance actions. Legislation is in regard to marketing and distribution of opioids and lawsuits filed against pharmaceutical companies. The bill is in the Senate Judiciary committee.
- HB 137 (Lorenz) Permit tax authority to decline submitting certain levy to voters. Health districts and libraries have levies approved by the County Commissioners as taxing authorities and this legislation changes the language from “shall” to “may” place a levy on the ballot. Since health districts receive no funding from County Commissioners, the Commissioners could hear the request and decline to place a health district or library levy on the ballot. In Greene County our requests are approved by representatives appointed to the Board of Health by elected officials from cities, villages and townships and the Budget Commission. The budget is also approved by the District Advisory Council and Fiscal Committee and full Board of Health. In House Local Government Committee with no co-sponsors. Opposition testimony was provided by AOHC. Proponent testimony was provided by CCAO.
- HB 160 Liquor and Cannabis (Stewart, B.) To revise specified provisions of the liquor control, hemp, and adult-use marijuana laws and to levy taxes on marijuana. The bill is in the House Judiciary Committee.
- HB 162 Medical Records (Click, G) Relates to medical records of minors and to name the My Child-My Chart Act. Representative Dean is a co-sponsor. The bill is in the Senate Health Committee. The amended version allows parents to be informed of healthcare provided to a minor within existing privacy protections. Notice is not required of providers who give care on an episodic basis, in an emergency room or urgent care center. The bill is in the Senate Health Committee.
- HB 182 Public Water Systems (Dean, L) To prohibit a public water system from adding fluoride to its water. The bill is in the House Natural Resources Committee.

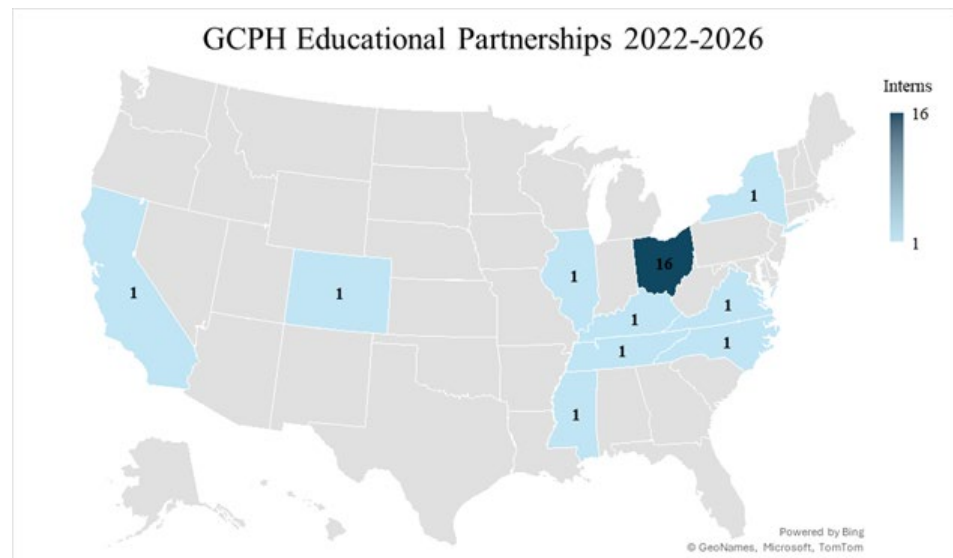
- HB 198 Hemp (Fischer, T) To regulate the manufacture, distribution, and sale of inhalable and ingestible hemp products. Representative Dean is a co-sponsor of the bill as it is in the House Judiciary Committee.
- HB 215 Property Tax Levies (Jarrells, D, Stephens, J) The bill is in the house ways and means committee and prohibits most property tax levies submitted at a general election from taking effect in the current year. The bill is in the House Ways and Means Committee.
- HB309 (Thomas) Modifies the law governing the county budget commissions, property taxation, and alternate apportionment formulas for local government and public library funds. AOHC provided interested party testimony. The bill passed and was signed by the Governor on 12/19/2025.
- HB335 (Thomas) Regards the authority of the county budget commission allowing them to reduce appropriations. Regulate sales tax and carryover funds. The bill passed and was signed by the Governor on 12/19/25.
- HB358 (Brewer, Fischer) Require distribution of information on firearm storage. In House Public Safety Committee.
- HB364 Requires food service operations note certain food allergies on the menu. In House Agriculture committee. The bill would need to be per food item.
- HB365 (Brennen) Enacts a property tax refund is in the House Ways and Means Committee.
- HB370 (Dean, Newman) Enacts the Ohio Prenatal Equal Protection Act which aims to provide legal protections for the unborn which some believe would eliminate all abortion and access to in vitro fertilization. The bill is in the House Judiciary Committee.
- HB380 (McNally, Fischer) Designate Migraine and Headache Awareness Month. The bill is in Health and Human Services: Public Health, Special Designations Committee.
- HB390 (Schmidt) Would prohibit health plan insurers from requiring or inducing providers to collect copayments and other cost sharing amounts. The bill is in the House Insurance Committee.
- HB401 (Rader, Baker) Designate Myositis Awareness Month. Myositis makes your immune system attack your muscles. The bill is in the Health and Human Services: Public Health, Special Designation Committee in the House.
- HB406 (Deeter, Dean) Enact the farm to consumer access to raw milk act. All milk contains lactose. No indigenous lactase exists in bovine raw milk. The bill is in the House Agriculture Committee.
- HB413 (Young, Peterson) Regards Ohio State, Local Government expenditure database. The bill is in the House Technology and Innovation Committee.
- HB420 (Click, Willis) Eliminates continuing levies. The bill is in the House Ways and Means Committee.
- HB421 (Click, Thomas) Taxpayers can vote to reduce inside millage. The bill is in the House Ways and Means Committee.

- HB 422 (Click, Newman) Triumph of the taxpayer. Changes the percentages by which levies must pass in excess of 1 mill. 420, 421 and 422 were put forward to address increased property valuations. The bill is in the House Ways and Means Committee.
- HB 424 (Willis, Craig) Regards the transfer and purchase of certain retirement service credit. The bill is in the House Public Insurance and Pensions Committee.
- HB425 (Hoops) Prohibits trespass and unauthorized recording by drones without proper authority or notice. The bill is in the House Transportation Committee.
- HB429 (Hoops) Ban healthcare reimbursement reduction from third-party payers. The bill is in the House Insurance Committee.
- HB435 Enact the right to Know Act (Williams, Miller) If a birth occurs en route to a facility the institution will offer genetic testing at no cost on the child and father to confirm paternity before signing the acknowledgement of paternity affidavit. The paternity test can be billed to insurance. The bill is in the House Judiciary Committee.
- HB438 (Radar, Brownlee) Enact the Family Act for fair access to medical insurance for local youth and families. Key provisions remove pre-existing conditions and waiting period rules, defines essential health services and prohibits lifetime maximums on basic health services.
- HB466 (Lear, Ritter) Requires certain approval before subdivision levies a property tax. The bill is in the House Local Government Committee.
- HB472 (Salvo, Cockley) is a bill introduced to waive ID, birth certificate fees for homeless individuals. Health districts may experience a loss of funding and be required to enumerate the number of birth certificates issued to persons experiencing homelessness annually. The bill was reported out of House Children and Human Services Committee.
- HB499 (Barhorst, King) Regards levies and restrictions to reducing levies. In the House Ways and Means Committee.
- HB502 (Humphrey) Appropriate funds for SNAP, TANF, and WIC upon lapse in federal funds. The bill is in the House Agriculture Committee.
- HB508 (Gross, Baker) Enact the better access to healthcare act. The bill is in the House Medicaid Committee.
- HB549 (Lorenz) is a bill to regulate cigar bars, create cigar sales and use tax exemption. Cigars smoked on the premises of a cigar bar would be exempt from sales and use tax. The bill is in the House Ways and Means Committee.
- HB520 (Matthews, Thomas) proposes a Blue Ribbon Committee for efficiency in county services. The bill is in the House local government committee. Health districts are not currently listed as members of a local committee.
- HB561 (Miller, Robb) revises childhood immunization laws and exemptions. Creates additional unfunded requirements for schools.
- HB578 requires tick-related disease to be reported to the department of health. Adds alpha-gal which is a sugar molecule found in most mammals

but not humans ,causing a delayed allergic reaction when transferred to humans via bites (generally the Lone Star tick) or reaction to consuming lamb, beef and pork.

- SB56 aims to close loopholes in sale of intoxicating hemp products, limit sales to licensed dispensaries and enforce age verification. The bill is in conference committee.
- SB 69 (Romanchuk) Intends to reform the state's public retirement system law. In Senate Financial Institutions, Insurance and Technology Committee.
- SB 78 (Hicks-Hudson, DeMora) Establish and operate the Ohio Health Care Plan – universal health care. The bill is in the Senate Financial Institutions, Insurance and Technology Committee.
- SB 86 (Huffman, Wilkin) Regulate and tax intoxicating hemp, drinkable cannabinoid product. Senator Koehler is a co-sponsor, and the bill is in the House General Government Committee.
- SB147 (Reineke) Revise solid waste and construction and demolition debris laws that govern the transfer and disposal of solid waste and construction and demolition debris. The changes provide procedures for withdrawing from a joint solid waste district. Has passed the Senate and was introduced in the house. The bill is in the House Community Revitalization Committee and the scope of the bill has been narrowed to only Seneca County will be effective 9/30/25.
- SB158 (Timken) To generally prohibit student cellular phone use in public schools. The bill passed the Senate and is in the House Education Committee.
- SB 161 SNAP (Schaffer Johnson) To require the Director of Job and Family Services to seek permission to exclude certain items from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program. This bill would require the Director to seek a waiver to exclude “junk food” from SNAP benefits. A similar provision was included in the budget to require JFS to seek a waiver to exclude sugar-sweetened beverages. The bill is in the Senate Health Committee.
- SB 166 Health Insurers (Manning) prohibit fees for electronic claims submission by health insurer and the Medicaid program. The bill is in the Senate Medicaid Committee.
- SB 198 (Koehler) Ensures Community Health Centers can continue to purchase medications at a discounted price through the 340B Drug pricing program.
- SB 201 (Schaffer) revises milk inspection fees and is in the Senate Finance and Appropriations Committee.
- SB 203 (Schaffer) Requires political subdivisions to adopt a cyber security plan. The bill is in the Senate Financial Institutions, Insurance and Technology Committee.
- SB209 (Curtona) Off-label drug use known as the Jeff, Dave, and Angie Patient Right to Try Act in the Senate Health and Human Services Health Care Committee.

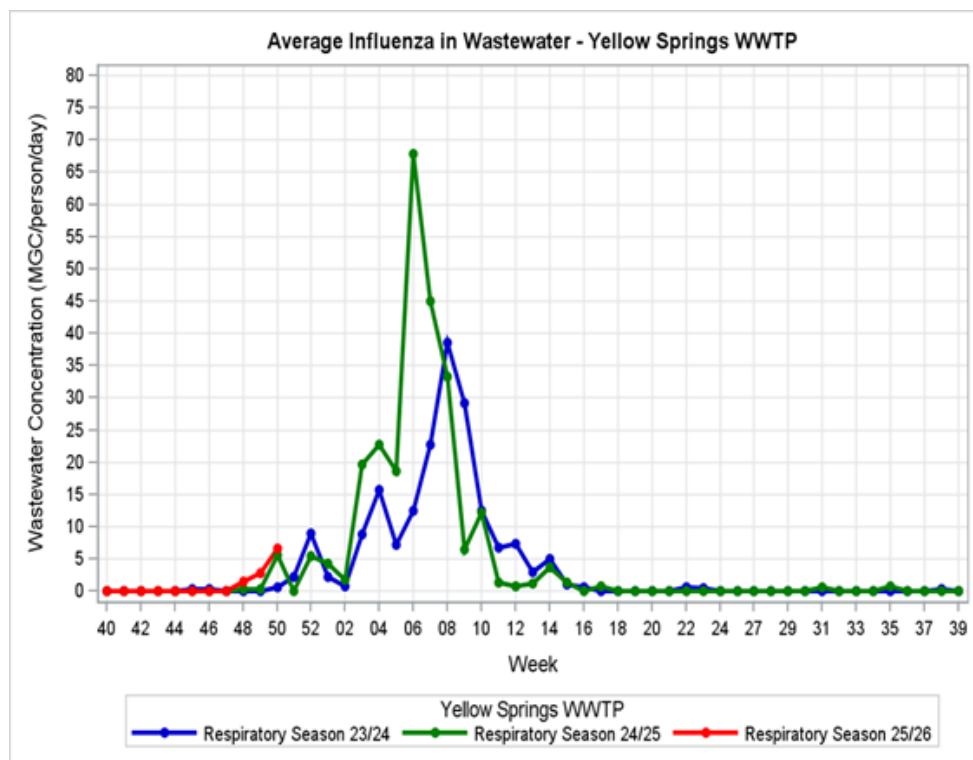
- SB220 establishes community paramedicine programs and to require insurance plans cover the services. The bill is in the Senate Financial Institutions, Insurance and Technology Committee.
 - SB227 Caps cost sharing for prescription insulin drugs. Senate Financial Institutions, Insurance and Technology Committee.
 - SB 230 (Romanchuk) Allows pharmacists to screen, test and treat for certain health conditions like flu, covid and RSV. The bill is in the Senate Health Committee.
 - SB 233 (Hicks-Hudson) Creates the Ohio local and organic food and farm task force. The bill is in the Senate Agriculture Committee.
 - SB246 (Smith) Prohibit terminating electric, gas services to certain households and establish a payment plan for the services. Certain medical professions including the Physician appointed by a Board of Health can submit documentation for qualifying medical conditions. The bill is in the Senate Public Utilities Committee.
 - SB258 (Lang and Romanchuk) Modify law governing advanced practice nursing to provide better access to healthcare. The bill is in the Senate Health Committee.
 - SB305 (Hicks-Hudson) Appropriate funds for SNAP, WIC, and TANF
- c. *Accreditation*
- i. Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB) initial and reaccreditation standards are open for review and comment through 12/31/2025.





d. *Epidemiology*

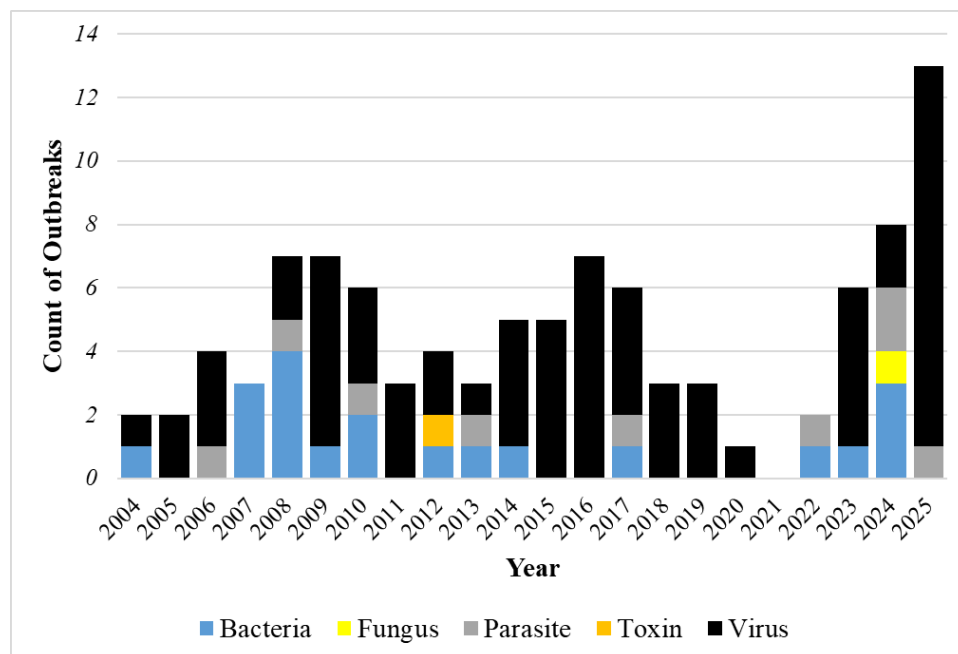
- i. There was an increase in influenza viral levels in the untreated wastewater at Yellow Springs wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) reported on 12/19/2025.

- iii. We're seeing an early uptick in flu activity through our wastewater monitoring, which often rises before we see increases in clinics or hospitals. This isn't a cause for alarm—it's simply a reminder for our communities to lean into the basics that keep people healthy. Encourage residents to wash hands regularly, stay home when they're sick, and keep indoor spaces well-ventilated. High-risk individuals should contact their healthcare provider early if symptoms begin, since antiviral treatment works best when started quickly. And it's still a good time for anyone who hasn't yet received their flu vaccine to do so. These simple steps help protect families, workplaces, and neighborhoods across the county.
- iv. Viral outbreaks have increased beyond historic levels in 2025 in Greene County.



This increase excludes outbreaks of cases due to COVID-19.

- v. *Candida auris* (C. auris) is a multidrug-resistant organism (MDRO) with specific public health strategies for containment. This fungal infection or colonization is a high public health priority, warranting specific, coordinated

actions to prevent spread within and between healthcare facilities. There are three tiers of areas with Tier 1 being never or rarely identified in the county, Tier 2 is that the organism is primarily seen within the healthcare setting. Tier 3 is endemic or frequently identified in the county, where the focus shifts from containment to ongoing prevention and management within facilities. As of 2025, Greene County is a Tier 2 area.

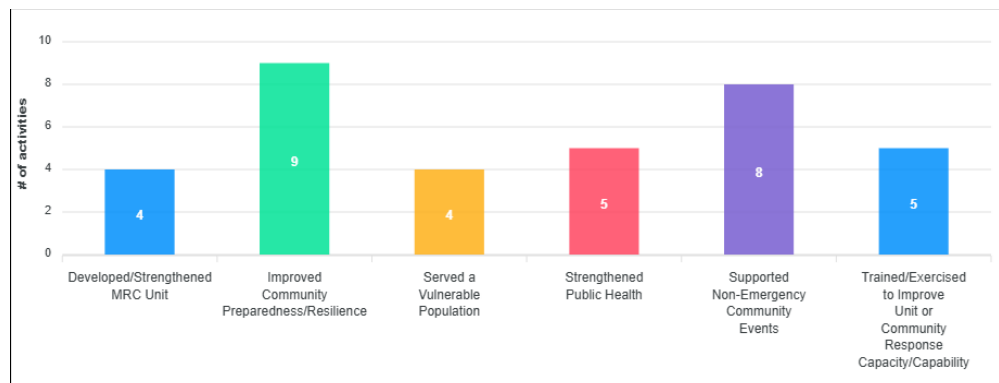

b. Emergency Preparedness

- Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP) funding is provided to support emergency response across Ohio. Flat or reduced funding will challenge districts to meet and improve capabilities assigned by the state and federal government. A shared services discussion occurred on December 22nd.
- Ten of nineteen deliverables for PHEP FY26 are complete, approved, and paid for a total of \$60,922.00.
- A deliverable of \$7,310.00 was approved in December for billing in January.

3. Environmental Health (EH)

- a. *Food Establishment/Food Service*
 - i. The 2026 food training schedule has been set and is posted on our webpage.
 - o [2026 Food Protection Course Schedule](#)
 - ii. The 2026 food license renewal applications and letters have been printed. These will be mailed out to our food operators at the beginning of January 2026.
 - iii. To date, GCPH has processed 257 temporary food licenses, conducted 406 inspections/consultations for out-of-county food mobiles, and performed 140 inspections/consultations for in-county food mobiles. The EH teams have performed a total of 242 temporary food inspections to date.
- b. *Body Art*
 - i. Body Art license renewals are due by January 2nd for the 2026 licensure year. To date, seven establishments have renewed their licenses. Letters will be mailed out in January to those delinquent establishments, and they will be assessed the appropriate penalty fee.
- c. *Mosquito*
 - i. We received our first electric-powered, ULV fogger, which was mostly paid for with Ohio Environmental Protection Agency (OEPA) grant funds. This equipment is a second step toward the ultimate goal of a certified organic mosquito control program.
- d. *Sewage*
 - i. The 2025 Sewage System Contractor registration information was held on December 4th. Forty contractors attended and received 6.0 hours of continuing education credit. Special Services hosted an ‘informal discussion’ session to ensure contractors are aware of the requirements for properly filling out septage pumping report forms, sewage system installation “as-builts”, septic and private water system permits, and the supplementary documents such as sealing reports and job status completion forms.
 - ii. Sewage contractor registration renewals for 206 have been sent out for Installers, Service Providers, and Haulers.
 - iii. To date, GCPH has completed two replacement systems under the Water Pollution Control Loan Fund (WPCLF) program, with five additional projects in various stages of completion.
- e. *Solid Waste*
 - i. On December 18th, Special Services staff attended a meeting with Ohio EPA agents to discuss enforcement actions against a local salvage operator with an extraordinary number of junk tires. The owner has so far been cooperative and open to consultation. OEPA intends to take jurisdiction of the situation at the end of the year.

4. Health Education

- a. *Cribs for Kids*
 - i. The month began with 21 cribs. We have placed 2 cribs, leaving 19 cribs available.
- b. *Healthy Eating Active Living (HEAL)*
 - i. A food drive was hosted From December 15th through December 19th. Food donations will be used to stock little pantries at all four locations.

- a. The Fairborn WIC little pantry will be relocated to the Fairborn Library in the new year due to the relocation of services from that office.
- c. *Harm Reduction*
 - i. 12/01/25 Naloxone Training for staff at Greene County Educational Services Center

- d. *Ohio Buckles Buckeyes*
 - i. The month began with one car seat. In December, we received a delivery of 32 seats and distributed 10. Currently, we have 23 car seats available.
- e. *Safe Communities*
 - i. 12/17/25 Safe Communities Coalition meeting.
 - ii. Planning for the Mocktail Challenge at CSU is ongoing.
 - iii. Beginning to plan for the upcoming Super Bowl campaign.
- f. *Tobacco*
 - i. Beginning to coordinate the 2026 Advocacy Through Art project and Color Walk.
 - ii. C. Edwards provided Vape Education at Xenia High School and was invited to return next semester.

5. Maternal Child Health (MCH)

- a. *Complex Medical Help (CMH)*
 - i. GCPH CMH nurses are working with the Soin Family Medicine Residency and Community Outreach Program, educating them on GCPH programs and working with the Ohio Department of Health CMH Field Nurse Case Manager to educate them on becoming CMH providers.
- b. *Early Intervention (EI)*
 - i. December was busy as we completed appraisals and began the 45-day state compliance program, which runs from November 17 to February 15. This period is particularly challenging because it includes two holidays. The staff is working diligently to ensure all required activities are completed.
 - ii. In November, the state Advisory Council for Early Intervention held its quarterly meeting. The council announced that the state budget will create a new main Advisory Council to oversee early intervention programs. Instead of having separate councils for each program, there will be subcommittees focused on specific areas. This change will start in January 2026.
 - iii. The subcommittee that was called Early Intervention and Home Visiting will be renamed Early Identification, Inclusion & Home Visiting. This new name emphasizes the importance of identifying developmental needs early and promoting inclusion in early childhood services. P. Hamer has been invited to continue her work on this committee. This allows her to advocate for effective programs that support children and families.
- c. *Early Childhood Home Visiting*
 - i. On December 3rd, C. Manor, T. Sparks, and C. Washburn represented GCPH and our programs at the Greene County Resource Fair at Toward Independence. This event was sponsored by the United Way.
